

Prague, Czechoslovakia – Local Revolutionary Scout Post




The Czechoslovak Scouts provided a Mail Delivery Service 7-25 November, 1918 in Prague for the National Committee of Liberation, while their country was having a new birth of freedom. The postal card was issued 7 November, 1918 and use ended on 25 November. The card was intended for use between the Scouts themselves and official use for the revolutionary group Czech National Committee of Liberation. The cards were not sold to the general public and are considered official delivery items. Engraver: J. Panenka. Printed by Kollman of Kral Vinohrady in Prague.

Embossed blue printing from the same die as the 10 Heller postage stamp. 1,000 cards were printed.


Japan - visit by Baden-Powell


1919 Straits Settlements - Singapore and South Malaya Boy Scouts Association

Baden-Powell undertook many travels all over the world. On 2 April, 1912 he was welcomed to Yokohama, Japan by a cheering boatful of Japanese Scouts and Scouts of the British colony. He met with Scouts and their leaders, attended receptions and promoted Scouting wherever he came. The 1912 world tour was also most important for B-P personally; it was on this trip that he met his future wife, Miss Olave Soames, on board the S/S *Arcadian* en-route from England to the West Indies.

The Boy Scouts Movement (Scouting in Singapore) was inaugurated 1910. Additional printing on postal card. Unknown printing date and quantity. Postmark SINGAPORE 3 NO 1919.

A visit by Baden-Powell to Siam prior to 1920 resulted in the most enthusiastic support of Scouting by King Rama VI, who then became the first president of the Siamese Boy Scouts Association. Stamps and postal cards were overprinted and surcharged. The surcharge went to the Boy Scouts, literally the Tiger Cubs of the Wild Tiger Corps.




Type 1 overprint by hand, using a rubber handstamp, with the emblem of the "Wild Tiger Corps" Scouting organisation — a tiger head, and "Scout's Fund" in Siamese. The original card was issued 1919. Overprinted by Post & Telegraph Department, Bangkok. Issue date unknown; earliest reported usage 1 February 1920. Quantity printed is unknown. The selling price for this 2 Satang postal card was 5 Satang.



Type 2 overprint by hand, using a copper handstamp, with the Wild Tiger Corps emblem, the tiger head, and wording "Scout's Fund" in Siamese and English. The original card was issued 1914. Overprinted by Post & Telegraph Department, Bangkok. Issue date unknown; earliest reported usage 26 February 1920. Quantity printed is unknown. The selling price for this 5 Satang postal card was 10 Satang.




U.S.A – Boys' Life, The Boy Scouts' Magazine U.S.A. – First National Scout Jamboree

In 1911, George S. Barton, of Somerville, Massachusetts, founded, edited, and published the first edition of Boys' Life magazine, calling it Boys' and Boy Scouts' Magazine. Nearly 100 years later, Boys' Life Magazine is still vital, and has approximately 7 million readers an issue.






In 1938, the company Agniez Freres (Agniez Brothers) of Brussels issued two Publibel cards with denomination 40 c, and advertisement for liver paste. The French card (Publibel 443) has the text "SUPERBES ECHANTILLONS GRATUITS AUX SOCIÉTÉTS SCOUTS". The Dutch card (Publibel 444) has the text "PRACHTIGE KOSTELOOZE STALEN AAN DE PADVINDERSVEREENINGEN". The text translates to "Superb free samples to Scout units".










Postal card BK 112 C, printed 1945-1949. Sent from "LENA 17-12-47" to Harstad.
