Scout Rocket Mail - Belgium 1960



Rocket Mail: Rocket mail is the delivery of mail by rocket or missile. The rocket lands by deploying an internal parachute upon arrival. Dr. Adam J. de Bruijn from Amsterdam experimented with rockets, and he and his co-workers, members of the Nederlandse Ruimtevaart Studio (Dutch Space Flight Studio), launched more than 100 mail rockets in Europe from 1936 onwards. The rockets could travel 20 km or more. De Bruijn made an important contribution to the development of rocket mail.

The term *Scout Rocket Mail* is used to describe rocket mail associated with Scouting. Nederlandse Ruimtevaart Studio launched two mail rockets at Raeren, Belgium on April 27, 1960, in commemoration of the Golden Jubilee of Scouting in the United States. The **purpose** of this exhibit is to show the philately of these two rockets.

The **scope** encompasses all aspects of philately from these launching of these two rockets: locally issued Scout rocket stamps, presentation cards and astrograms, including proofs, colour varieties, flown covers and cards. Special rocket cachets identify mail from the rockets *Daniel Beard* and *Baden Powell II*, respectively. Flown covers carry a bicoloured locally printed rocket mail stamp. The stamps were issued imperforate and perforated in sheets of four. Special astrograms were produced; the rocket equivalent of aerograms or air-letters.

Rocket Baden Powell II

Named after Lord Baden-Powell of Gilwell (1857-1941), founder of the Scout Movement and Chief Scout of the World.

Rocket Daniel Beard

Named after Daniel Carter "Uncle Dan" Beard (1850-1941), an American illustrator, author, youth leader, and social reformer who founded the Sons of Daniel Boone in 1905. Beard merged his organization into the Boy Scouts of America when it was founded in 1910. He later became editor of *Boys' Life*, the BSA official magazine.

ASTROGRAM PROOF



Astrograms of two different types were prepared for the rocket flights.



The Scout mail rockets were launched in commemoration of the Golden Jubilee of Scouting in the United States.


The Boy Scouts of the Panama Canal Zone were founded in 1947, and had ties to the Boy Scouts of America.

Astrogram type 2 with Canal Zone Boy Scout FDC, postmarked "BALBOA FEB 8 1960".

Flown on rocket Baden Powell II April 27, 1960, special flight cachet in blue. Signed by the rocketeer Dr. A. J. de Bruijn.

The stamps were printed in two colours, brown and red.

PROOF SHEET, BROWN COLOUR



Sheet of four Scout rocket stamps. The stamps are perforated on two sides. Not flown. Colour separation, brown colour only. Believed to be of proof status.

PROOF SHEET, RED COLOUR



Sheet of four Scout rocket stamps. The stamps are perforated on two sides. Not flown. Colour separation, red colour only. Believed to be of proof status.

A brown and red bi-coloured rocket mail stamp was produced locally.

The sheets of Scout rocket stamps were printed se-tenant with similar sheets for a flight commemorating the VIII Winter Olympics. The Olympic rocket flight took place on the same day as the Scout rockets.



Uncut imperforate sheet of four Scout rocket stamps,

printed se-tenant with a similar sheet for an Olympic rocket flight. Most sheets were cut prior to use for the Scout and Olympic flights, respectively. A brown and red bi-coloured rocket mail stamp was produced locally. The stamps were issued imperforate and perforated in sheets of four.





The Boy Scouts of the Panama Canal Zone were founded in 1947, and had ties to the Boy Scouts of America. Canal Zone Boy Scout FDC postmarked "BALBOA FEB 8 1960" flown in rocket *Baden Powell II* April 27, 1960. Imperforate Scout rocket stamp and special rocket flight cachet in blue. Signed by the rocketeer Dr. A. J. de Bruijn. 50 of the covers flown in rocket *Baden Powell II* were Boy Scout FDCs from the Canal Zone dated February 8, 1960. These had been sent to the addressee in Ridgewood, N.Y. in February.
