Scouting Norway

- the postal history of Scouting in Norway up to 1957 -



The purpose of this exhibit is to show the early postal history of Scouting in Norway.

The scope is to examine the interaction of the postal system with the Scout and Guide movements in Norway up to 1957, which marks the Golden Jubilee of Scouting. The emphasis is on showing postal usage of all Norwegian Scout postmarks together with all the recorded Scout postal stationeries in the period, and it is the first time these are all shown.

Background: Baden-Powell held his first trial camp for boys 1907 on Brownsea Island near Poole, Dorset, and Scouting for boys really took off in England the year after. It quickly spread to other countries and came to Norway 1909. The Norwegian Boy Scout Association was founded 1911, and Girl Guiding / Scouting started 1912. Several other organisations took up Scouting, including YWCA, YMCA, the Salvation Army, Methodists, Baptists, etc.

Personal research: The exhibit contains all Scout and Guide postmarks from Norway up to 1957. It is the first time that all these are present in a collection/exhibit, and as such, this exhibit with several only recorded items cannot be duplicated. Census of rare items is based on the exhibitor's own recording during more than 50 years of collecting Scout philately.

Important items are marked with thick red frame.

Up to 1930: Growth and work during war and peace

Scouting starts in Norway

The first Scouting activity in Norway took place in 1909. In 1910, Norwegian Boys' Scout Corps was founded as a subgroup under the Norwegian Confederation of Sports, but it only lasted until 1912. Also in 1910, Christian Dons, a businessman, and the Rev. Hans Møller Gasmann formed Scout troops in Kristiania, the then name of Oslo, the capital of Norway. Dons and Gasmann joined forces spring 1911 and founded the Norwegian Boy Scout Association. This was the beginning of the Scout Movement in Norway. The number of Scouts/Guides increased steadily to approx. 20,000 in 1930.



The Norwegian Boy Scout Association was founded 1911

CHR. DONS, CHIEF SCOUT OF NORWAY 1911-1920

Christian Fredrik Dons (1886-1953)was Norwegian businessman from Christiania (Oslo). During a stay in England he joined the 1. North London Troop. ran by Lord Kitchener. Upon return to Norway he founded the First Christiania Scout Troop in 1910.

With Hans Møller Gasmann he founded the Norwegian Boy Scout Association 1911, and he was the association's first Chief Scout until 1920.

Old Christiania postmarks were used in parallel with Kristiania postmarks. 10 øre rate for letters first weight-class 1.7.1877-1.7.1919.

The Danish Scout Corps held their second national camp 16-26 July 1919. 1,600 Danish, 50 Norwegian and 50 Swedish scouts participated in the camp at the estate Hindsgavl near Middelfart.

The Danish Y.M.C.A. Scouts held their second national jamboree in 1920 at Skamlingsbanken near Kolding on Jutland. 1,000 Scouts participated, including small contingents from Norway and Sweden.

1920 U.K. hosting the first World Jamboree

The first World Scout Jamboree was organized by The Boy Scout Association in London and took place in London, England, in the exhibition halls of Olympia from 30 July to 8 August 1920. Around 5,000 Scouts were encamped at the Old Deer Park in nearby Richmond. The Scouts rotated in and out of Olympia to give them all the opportunity to participate in the events there. The Thames flooded the campsite one night and Scouts had to be evacuated. Olympia hosted numerous exhibitions, pageants and contests during the Jamboree event.

The Norwegian contingent to the first World Jamboree counted only 54 Boy Scouts.



The Jamboree did not have its own post office or a special postmark, but a boxed, square cachet was used on mail from the camp.

1920, National camps and smaller district camps were regularly held

National camps had been held 1914 in Oslo and 1916 in Bergen. The planned 1918 camp was cancelled due to the influenza pandemic (the Spanish flu), and the Norwegian Scout Association's third national camp took place in Trondhjem 5-12 July, 1920. 900 Boy Scouts participated, including for the first time troops from Northern Norway. Again, pre-erected tents were used and the meals were served at a nearby school. A post office is mentioned in the camp report, but it did not have a special postmark.


1920, THE THIRD NATIONAL CAMP

300 Norwegian and 21 British Boy Scouts attended the 1921 district camp for the Møre Scouts. The camp was located on the Aarø farm, one hour march from Molde town, where the Scouts had arrived by boat. The Scouts gave a large display in Molde for 1,000 spectators, where all troops plus the camp orchestra participated.

Norwegian Boy Scouts Association's fourth national camp took place 7-16 July 1924 on Storhamar's ground near Hamar, and represented quite a revolution. It was the first large Norwegian Scout camp where the patrol system was implemented, but not yet to a full extent. The Scouts were preparing the food themselves, in groups of 50, successfully! Emphasis was put on development of troop areas, including construction of beautiful portals and spectacular camp facilities. King Haakon VII of Norway visited the camp - and it was the first time the King visited a national Scout camp. The Hamar camp formed the foundation for the Association's future large camps.

He writes to his mother in Bergen: "I have today travelled from the camp by the Special Scout train, and left the train at Lilleströmmen for visiting Olav...". The card is dated Lilleströmmen and postmarked on the train "KONGSVINGERB. POSTEKSP *B* 16 VII 24", arrival postmark "BERGEN 17 VII 24". 15 øre for domestic postcards 1.2.1921-1.6.1952.

"Scout Weeks" started to become popular in the 1920's, for good reasons. They gave an opportunity to show the public what Scouting is, and contributed financially to the Scout troops. Bergen district held such a Scout Week in 1925, from 27 March to 5 April, and included in the event was a large Scout Exhibition. The exhibition encompassed Troop exhibits (canoe camp, troop assembly room, scout radio, camp models, field hospitals, etc.) and workshops (shoemaker, carpenter, book-binder, electricians) showing outdoor and indoor Scouting activities.



YWCA Girl Guides are active from 1920

Queen Maud invited in 1917 the Danish Chief Guide to present the Guiding work. Among the guests was Margrethe Parm, national secretary for the YWCA. She took up the idea, and Guiding with the YWCA in Norway started 1920 with Margrethe Parm as Chief Guide.

The Norwegian YWCA Girl Guides held a leader training camp at Gleodden near Kristiansand 23-31 July 1925. Guide Leaders from the entire country participated in addition to two leaders from U.S.A. and London, U.K. The topics included "Be Prepared", "Discipline", "Guides' Own", "My Ideal of a Woman" and several others.



Scout Shops supplied uniforms and equipment to Scouts and Scout units

"Speiderdepotet" (The Scout Shop) was operated by the Norwegian Boy Scout Association from 1921 onwards. A shop was located in Oslo, with mail-order service for Scout units. It was replaced by "Speider-Sport" from 1945.

The Scout Label raised funds

The 1927 General Assembly of the Boy Scout Association approved the Board's proposal that a special "Scout Label" would be produced and offered for sale. The label was first advertised in their magazine "Speideren" No. 10 1927. Scout Troops could order the labels via the Scout District, and re-sell these to the Scouts or to others and make a profit from the sale. According to the instructions, the label should be affixed on the reverse of covers and on the left (message) side of postcards. Labels were sold for 5 øre; 50% went to the Troop, and 25% each to the District and the Scout Association. Apparently it was not a great success, and reminders to order the Scout Label were repeatedly printed in "Speideren"; for the last time in No. 4 1938 - more than ten years after it was initially put on sale.



VISITING THE YWCA GIRL GUIDE EXHIBITION IN OSLO

The YWCA Girl Guides held a national exhibition in Oslo 13-16 March, 1927, 2,000 of the 4,600 Girl Guides in Norway were gathered in Oslo. The exhibition was a gargantuan task for the only 6 years old association, but it was a great success, opened by H.M. King Haakon VII. The exhibition visualised guiding activities.

The Swedish Boy Scout Association marked their 15th anniversary with a jubilee camp at the manor Beatelund, east of Stockholm. Nearly 4,000 Boy Scouts from 15 countries attended the association's fourth national camp, including 170 Boy Scouts from Norway. Baden-Powell visited the camp and stated in a radio broadcast that it was the best Scout camp that he had seen. The jubilee camp post office used Sweden's first official Scout postmark (S-001) 8-19 July, 1927.

1928 National Camp and Norway's first official Scout postmark

In 1928, Norwegian Boy Scout Association held their fifth national camp near Åndalsnes in Romsdalen, on the northwestern coast of Norway. Following the learnings from the 1924 Hamar camp, the patrol system was now fully implemented. Scouting was on a positive wave, membership numbers soared and as many as 5,200 Boy Scouts attended. 310 troops out of 400 were represented. 200 foreign Scouts came from Denmark, Sweden, Scotland, England, Latvia, Belgium, Poland, France and the U.S.A. The camp post office had for the first time in Norway a special postmark (N-001) which was used 6-15 July.

Up to 1930: Growth and work during war and peace 1929 U.K. hosting the 3rd World Scout Jamboree, and Journal "The Scout"

The 3rd World Scout Jamboree was held in 1929 at Arrowe Park in Birkenhead, UK, commemorating the 21st birthday of the Scouting movement. With about 30,000 Scouts and over 300,000 visitors attending, this jamboree was the largest jamboree ever. The Norwegian contingent consisted of 335 Scouts and leaders.

"Speideren" (The Scout) was issued from 1911 onwards by the Norwegian Boy Scout Association. It was issued monthly, later reduced to quarterly, and mailed to all Scouts. The journal still exists.

1930 Etne District Camp - small camp with a special postmark

In 1930, Bergen district of the Norwegian Boy Scout Association held their summer camp in Etne, located some 100 km south of Bergen. 434 Boy Scouts participated, including Scouts from Sweden and Denmark. The field post office which served the camp used a special postmark (N-002) from 29 June to 10 July.


Up to 1930: Growth and work during war and peace 1930 Salvation Army Guides in Trondheim and YMCA National Camp in Sweden

1930, SALVATION ARMY GUIDES NATIONAL CAMP IN TRONDHEIM

The Salvation Army took up scouting and guiding early, and corps were founded 1924 for boys and 1925 for girls, with the name Life Saving Scouts/Guides being used until 1941.

The Life Saving Guides held their second national camp at Strindheim School in Trondheim.

In 1930, Swedish YMCA Scout Association held their national camp at Lake Ältasjön, just about 10 km southeast of Stockholm. Several Norwegian troops participated in the camp.

The Scouts' Sanitary Reserve / Relief Troop is formed and trained

Several Scout Districts formed Relief Troops to act as sanitary reserve units. These assisted with first-aid at public events and was a pre-cursor for the Red Cross Relief Corps. Red Cross took over this activity later in the 1930's.


1931-1939: Roaming through happy years of Scouting

Scouting is well established - camps in Norway and abroad

Scouting was by now well established in Norway, and a rota of national camps every four years, with smaller district camps in-between proved practical. Several religious associations like the YWCA, YMCA, Methodist Church and Salvation Army started their own Scouting groups. The number of Scouts/Guides increased to approximately 30,000 in this period.

In 1931, the Boy Scouts of the Epworth Liga (Methodist Church youth organisation) held their national camp at Gleodden near Kristiansand. **260 Norwegian Boy Scouts participated**, plus three from Sweden and 15 from Denmark.

Swedish Scout Association's fifth national camp took place in 1931 at Kulla Gunnarstorp near Hälsingborg. Several thousand Scouts participated, including **55 from Norway**. The special postmark was used 10-21 July, 1931.

The Norwegian Boy Scouts Association's sixth national camp took place in 1932 in Mandal on the southern coast of Norway. The camp motto was "Sun and Sea", and indeed it matched. 5,300 Boy Scouts participated, including guests from many countries. The camp had 12,000 visitors on the Sunday, which is very impressive, considering that Mandal only had 4,000 inhabitants in 1932. A field post office operated in the camp 6-13 July, and used a special postmark (N-003). The postmark shows a small Scout badge at the bottom.



It was not approved, and in the 10 June re-engraving (below) the asterix was substituted by a small Boy Scout Badge, probably in order to visualise that this was a Boy Scout camp.



The Norwegian Y.W.C.A. Girl Guides held their fourth national camp 6-13 July 1932 near Elverum. 1,700 Girl Guides participated, including guests from England, Germany, Denmark, Faroe Islands, Sweden, Finland and the United States. The camp did not have its own postmark.

1933 saw Norwegian Girl Guide Association's fourth national camp which was held at Fåberg near Lillehammer. The camp site was on the Army's Jørstadmoen camp area. This was the first real tent camp for Girl Guides in Norway, and the Troops organised cooking of their own food. 1,100 Girl Guides participated, including guests from several countries. This was the first Girl Guide camp in Norway where a special postmark (N-004) was used 3-11 July by the temporary rural post office.




Engraver's trial strikes of the postmark. Note that the shape of the year "33" in the adjustable date is different in the two postmarks. Possibly the postmark engraving was completed on 1 June (left postmark), and tested with "33" which for unknown reasons was not approved or used. Then another set of date types "33" were employed on 10 June (right postmark). The types in the postmark to the right seem identical to the types that were actually used. Both trial strikes are believed to be unique.

The Jamboree Camp Chief was the Chief Scout of Hungary, Count Teleki Pál, a member of the World Scout Committee who had previously been and would later once again become Prime Minister of Hungary.

BADEN-POWELL VISITS NORWAY

Baden-Powell visited Norway on several occasions: in 1911, 1912, 1927, 1933 and 1938.

In 1933, Lord and Lady Baden-Powell led a contingent of 650 Guides and Scouts on an "Argosy of Peace", a cruise to the nations of the Baltic. The cruise carried them from England to the Netherlands, Poland, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Finland, Sweden, Norway and home. The Norway stop was in Oslo.

In 1939, Baden-Powell and Olave BP moved to a cottage he had commissioned in Nyeri, Kenya, near Mount Kenya, where he had previously been for recuperation. BP died peacefully there 1941.









Many of the participants had to evacuate from their tents and seek shelter in the nearby farm buildings or in the schoolhouse. The sun was only present during the Sunday church service and on the departure day.

















1940-1945: War and oppression; keeping the spirit alive

Scouting was banned during the second world war

The occupation of Norway by Nazi Germany started with the invasion of Norway on 9 April 1940. All forms of Scouting were banned in September 1941. The funds, equipment, banners and even uniform details were to be turned over to the authorities. Scout leaders tucked away what they could, but most of the groups lost much of their equipment and funds. After the war, Scouting was quickly taken up again.







As thunderbolt war came to Norway on 9 April 1940 with the German nazi invasion. For most people it meant radical change, not least because Norway had no experience of war since 1814.

Most activities came to an abrupt halt. Scouts made an effort in terms of assistance to the civilian population, and from the Civil Air Defence came a request for assistance, including cloud warning service. Norway surrendered on 7 June when the King and government left for England to continue the struggle to again liberate the country.

Slowly, Scouting picked up again during the summer and fall. Chief Scout Gasmann recommended in a message that caution should be shown and no provocation.



1941 Scouting continues despite difficulties due to the war

1941, the Trondhjem and Trøndelag districts of the Norwegian Girl Guide Association held a joint camp at Naust on the Ytterøy island in the Trondheims fjord. This was one of the few larger camps that it was possible to carry out in 1941. The camp motto was "Hold on tight, hold together, hold out".



In 1941, 2,100 YMCA Boy Scouts were gathered for the Swedish national camp at Olofsborg, Västergötland. Even in neutral Sweden, strict rationing due to the war affected the supplies to the camp. The special postmark (S-007) was used 5-17 July.

1941 the Chief Scout encourages to make the best of the situation

Following the German invasion, all forms of corporate activity, Scouting included, ceased, but the Scouts remained and soon activities picked up again. The Scouts were heartened by a letter sent to them by the Chief Scout of Norway "Now that the war is here it is no use asking why and for how long. What counts is to make the best of conditions as they are.". Two months after the invasion many Troops were able to organize summer camps as replacement for the national camp which had been cancelled, and in 1941, even a few district camps were held.

This situation would not last, for Quisling and his followers had founded a youth organisation which they intended would swallow up the Scout Movement. By autumn 1941, it was obvious that persuasion would yield no result and Scouting was suppressed.

LETTER FROM THE CHIEF SCOUT

The 1927 "Be Prepared" Scout Label is affixed to front of the cover - let this be a symbol of the virtues of Scouting. The Nazi authorities banned Scouting less than a month after this letter was sent. 20 øre postage for domestic letters to 20g 1.1.1921-1.10.1946.

Proclamation.

"According to decree of 11 and 12 September this year, the Norwegian Boy Scout Association, the Norwegian Girl Guide Association, the Salvation Army's Life-saving Scouts (divisions for boys and girls), and the Norwegian YWCA Girl Guides are dissolved. All properties shall be handed over to the appointed representative, captain Björn Falchenberg, Stortingsgaten 12, III, Oslo."



Cover sent locally in Trondheim, postmarked "TRONDHEIM 23 9 41", with the sad information (see next page) to Girl Guides regarding the dissolvement of the Scout units. 10 øre postage rate for local letters 1.7.1927-1.10.1946; one 5 øre postage stamp removed.

All the Scouting equipment had to be deposited, and Scouting activites were banned. Funds and properties were confiscated and liquidated.

Luckily, quite some local equipment was successfully hidden away. Many Scouts held concealed meetings, some joined the Home Front resistance movement, others fled to Sweden and England, and it cannot be denied that some joined the Nazi youth organization.

Björn Falchenberg who is mentioned in the decree had been employed as travelling secretary for the Boy Scout Association, but the Association withdrew this position due to strained economy. He was dismissed and left the Association from September 30, 1940.

Mr. Falchenberg had been active in the Nazi party and other Nazi organisations since 1936. When the ban came in 1941, he unfortunately had detailed knowledge of the assets of the various Scout units.

He was sentenced to eight years in prison after the war.


1941 Scouting is banned

The University Library in Oslo, established in 1811, has taken care of national library functions since the compulsory legal deposit requirement came in 1815. In 1883, the Norwegian department at the University was established as a result of the Norwegian Legal Deposit Act of 1882, revised in 1939.

The printers of Blommenholm Scout Troop's journal *Yxahofdi* are reminded to submit as soon as possible issues 1941 No. 3 etc. of the journal. It is signed A. Garborg – son of famous Norwegian writer Arne Garborg. *Yxahofdi* (Ox Head) is the 14th-16th century name of a local Blommenholm farm. The name was changed to Blommenholm around 1800.

Note his request is dated after the ban and dissolvement of Scouting, and it is thus unlikely that the request was fulfilled – at least there were no further Scout journals issued after September 1941.

1943 Scout properties are confiscated and liquidated

The Nazis dissolved the Scouting associations and took over all their properties and belongings.

At the same time, the Nazi intention was that the Unghirden youth organisation (young storm troopers) would be the only route to official positions and the only lawful meeting places for youth. It was never a success.

One can only guess that the letter content was about bank accounts belonging to a Scout unit and the funds being confiscated by the Nazis.



1943 Norwegian Boy Scout Association in Great Britain

Throughout the war years a number of Norwegians fled the Nazi regime, mostly across the border to Sweden. Many refugees were men of military age wishing to join the Norwegian armed forces abroad. Before the German invasion of Russia a number of them managed to make their way out of Sweden and travel over Russian territory to England.

Quite a few of these had a background in Scouting, and wanted to continue the Scout work in exile. In August 1941 the Norwegian Scout Club in Great Britain was formed, affiliated to the Norwegian Boy Scout Association, with Victor Carlsen as chairman. He had been involved with the armed resistance in Norway 1940, and came to England fall 1940.

When the news of the abolishment of Scouting Norway reached England, colonel J. S. Wilson, who also was director for the International Bureau. chairman summoned Victor Carlsen and appointed him Chief Scout of Norway and authorised him to act on behalf of the Association.

Thus, the Norwegian Boy Scouts Association operated continuously throughout the war. Mr. Carlsen was former District Chief Scout for Vesterlen district, and he became a director for the Norwegian Boy Scouts Association 1945-1948.

1945 the scout-like YMCA Triangle Boys became YMCA Scouts

YMCA in Norway started a Scout-like branch in 1932, called the Triangle Boys. While regular Scouting was banned by the nazi authorities from 1941, entities that belonged to an organization like the YWCA could continue to operate. The scout-like Triangle Boys became very popular during the war, and the YMCA formed their own Scout association in 1945.



Scouting starts again after the war on a wave of excitement

Scouting started again after the war on a wave of excitement. Boys and girls lined up to become Scouts and Guides. The total membership peaked above 55,000, and this level was maintained for the next 25 years.

Hans Möller Gasmann, born 1872, was Chief Scout of Norway 1920-1945, and honourary Chief Scout from 1945 until his death in 1961. He named his house "Speiderheimen" – the Scout Home.

In 1946, The Swedish Scout Association held their national camp on the island Gränsö in southeastern Sweden. 8,000 participants, including 700 foreign Scouts from 11 nations, made this the until then largest Scout camp in Sweden. The special postmark (S-008) was used 12-22 July.

The Norwegian National Aid Fund for the Victims of the War (Nasjonalhjelpen) was in operation during the war 1940-1945 and in the first post-war years, for collecting and distributing aid to war victims.

After the liberation, the National Aid set up the so-called H7 Lottery (named for HM King Haakon VII) for the benefit for distressed and war victims. Buyers of lottery tickets would submit the ticket number on a postcard franked with a semi-postal stamp for the benefit of the National Aid. The lottery was a success.

1946 Guide Jubilee Camp at Inderøy

In 1946, Norwegian Girl Guide Association held the first large camp after the war, to celebrate their 25th anniversary. The jubilee camp on the Inderøy island was for 450 Guide Leaders and Ranger Guides. On the agenda was a visit to Stiklestad, famous for the 1030 battle where King Olaf "the Big" Haraldsson was killed. He was later canonized as Saint Olaf. The field post office in the camp used a special postmark (N-009) from 29 July to 5 August.









Scouting saw a boost in membership numbers after WW II, and with its 12,000 participants the 1948 camp of the Norwegian Boy Scout Association was the largest Scout camp in Norway prior to Nordjamb in 1975. The camp was called "Speiderbyen" (The Scout Town). The field post office in the camp used a special hand cancel (N-012) 2-12 July and for the first time a machine cancel with camp slogan (N-013) 3-12 July. In addition the field post office also was equipped with an official signet or seal; use of this is not recorded.







In 1950, Bergen district of the Norwegian Boy Scouts Association held a camp on Tvildemoen near Voss. 673 Scouts participated, including guests from Denmark, Sweden and the U.S.A. The camp motto was "Brotherhood".







Scouting in Austria started in 1912 and was one of the founding members of the World Organization in 1922. Scouting ceased to exist in 1938 with the occupation of the Nazis who banned all Scouting activities. In 1946, at the conclusion of the war, Austria was again admitted into the World Organization. The national organisations combined to form the Pfadfinder Österreichs, which hosted the 7th World Jamboree in Bad Ischl in 1951 with 12,884 participants from 61 countries. The Norwegian contingent consisted of 153 Scouts and Scouters.







The 8th World Scout Jamboree was held in 1955 and was hosted by Canada at Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario. This was the first World Jamboree to be held in the Western Hemisphere, and the first outside of Europe. More than 11,000 Scouts from 71 countries and colonies attended this gathering, however only four from Norway.











1950-1957: Better Scouting for more Boys and Girls 1957 U.K. hosting the Jubilee Jamboree and 16th World Scout Conference

The 9th World Scout Jamboree – the Jubilee Jamboree – took place in Sutton Coldfield, Warwickshire in 1957. The Jamboree was located in Sutton Park. 33,000 Boy Scouts representing 90 countries attended, including 341 Scouts from Norway.



Mail posted within the camp was handled in the temporary sorting office adjacent to the main sorting office in the yard of Sutton Park Station. First Day Covers were also handled here.

The mail cancelling machine was furnished with a special Jamboree slogan.


